Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment.

# Today's hymns

"We Shall Overcome" and "Go Down, Moses" are both in our hymn book, Lift Every Voice and Sing. We are singing them today in observance of tomorrow's national holiday, Juneteenth. After the Union army forced the surrender of Confederate General Edmund Kirby Smith at Galveston on June 2, 1865, the emancipation of slaves in Texas became reality. On June 19, 1865, 250,000 enslaved people were freed and that day marked an official date of emancipation for the enslaved population. The official end of slavery in the United States came with the 13th Amendment in 1865.

"We shall overcome," a song of promise, became well known during the Civil Rights movement of the 1950's and 60's. Its origins date back to a folk song that slaves would sing as they worked in the fields—"I'll be all right someday." Learn more at this link.

"Go Down Moses" discusses the liberation of the ancient Jewish people from Egyptian slavery. This story held a second meaning for enslaved African Americans, as they related their experiences under slavery to those of Moses and the Israelites who were enslaved by the pharaoh, and they resonated with the message that God will come to the aid of the persecuted. Sarah Bradford's authorized biography of Harriet Tubman, Scenes in the Life of Harriet Tubman (1869), quotes Tubman as saying she used "Go Down Moses" as one of two code songs used with fugitive enslaved people to communicate when fleeing Maryland. Tubman began her underground railroad work in 1850 and continued until the beginning of the Civil War. Some people even hypothesize that she herself may have written the spiritual. Others claim that Nat Turner, who led one of the most well-known slave revolts in history, either wrote or was the inspiration for the song. Tis a gift to be simple" is a <u>Shaker</u> song written and composed in 1848, generally attributed to Elder <u>Joseph Brackett</u> from <u>Alfred Shaker Village</u>. The song was largely unknown outside Shaker communities until <u>Aaron Copland</u> used its melody for the score of <u>Martha Graham</u>'s ballet, <u>Appalachian Spring</u>, first performed in 1944.

The text to "Come, Labor On" was written by Jane L. Borthwick (b. Edinburgh, Scotland, 1813; d. Edinburgh, 1897) and published it in her *Thoughts for Thoughtful Hours* (1859) in seven, six-line stanzas. Borthwick revised the text into its present five-line form and published that version in her *Thoughts for Thoughtful Hours* of 1863. Borthwick was a member of the Presbyterian Free Church of Scotland and had a strong interest in the church's mission work. She also supported Moravian missions in Labrador, Canada, and was involved in social service work in Edinburgh. T. (Thomas) Tertius Noble (b. Bath, England,

1867; d. Rockport, MA, 1953) composed the hymn tune ORA LABORA for Borthwick's text when it was accepted in 1916 for inclusion in the Episcopal hymnal, on whose commission Noble served. ORA LABORA, which means "pray and work," was also published in *The New Hymnal* of 1918. Learn more at this link.
