The Prayers of the People

The children have been studying water in their class, so today's prayers focus on water.

In the beginning, the Spirit of God hovered over the waters. The water that God called into being is at the heart of all that lives. Mindful of the many ways water affects our lives, let us pray for our waters, especially for the health of the Rappahannock River, and for the life of the world around us.

Silence

I ask your prayers for all people of faith, and for the transformations in their lives that are marked by the sacredness of water: at the Red Sea, in the Jordan River, in ritual baths, in the washing of feet, and in Holy Baptism. We give thanks for the living water that Jesus gives, the spring of water gushing up to eternal life in us, and that takes away our thirst.

Silence

I ask your prayers for the leaders of nations, corporations, and communities around the world, that they may exercise wise stewardship over the waters of their lands, so that all people may have clean water to drink and may live free from waterborne diseases. May all have the wisdom to shape creative solutions to conflicts over water in the dry places of our planet. We give thanks for the City of God to come, where the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb, flows through the middle of the City, lined with the tree of life, with its leaves for the healing of the nations.

Silence

I ask your prayers for all of creation, and especially for the waters of the earth: for oceans and seas, for rivers and streams, for lakes and ponds, for watersheds, marshes, and swamps, for the waters beneath the ground; and for all creatures that live in the waters of the earth. We give thanks that at the beginning, God gathered together the waters under the sky, and let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm.

Silence

I ask your prayers for all who travel or work at sea or on inland waterways, and for oceanographers and for all who work for the conservation and health of the world's waters.

Silence

I ask your prayers for all those afflicted with too much water in flood or tsunami, storm, or ice; and for those people and creatures who suffer as glaciers and ice floes melt and shrink, for all who suffer from any natural disaster.

Silence

I ask your prayers for those on our prayer list, especially Suan and Helmut Linne von Berg, Andrea and Ken Pogue, for Toni and John Faibisy, and for Ruth Smith. May the healing waters of God's love wash over them and bring them health, healing and peace like a river in their hearts.

Silence

I ask your prayers for all who have died and for all who mourn, that their tears of grief may be turned to wellsprings of joy.

Silence

Almighty God, Creator of the earth, this sacred home we share: Give us new eyes to see the beauty all around and to protect the wonders of creation.

Give us new arms to embrace the strangers among us and to know them as family.

Give us new ears to hear and understand those who live off the land and sea, and to hear and understand those who extract its resources.

Give us new hearts to recognize the brokenness in our communities and to heal the wounds we have inflicted.

Give us new hands to serve the earth and its people and to shape beloved community.

For you are the One who seeks the lost, binds our wounds and sets us free.

And it is in the name of Jesus the Christ we pray. Amen.
